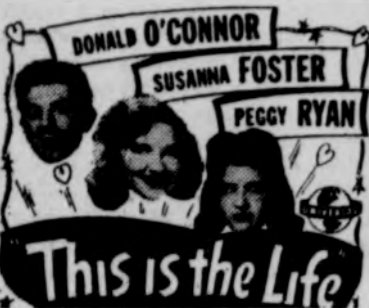

NEW RULES FOR HIRING LISTED

State Manpower Director L. C. Stoll

has announced additional hiring restrictions in the Amended Stabilization Program for Oregon which is effective July 6.

Some 25 controlled or priority referral areas have been established in the state and include the City of Pendleton, Rieth, Athena and Milton-Freewater in this county.

In the rest of the county there will be no great change in the program, according to Manager C. E. Long of the Pendleton United States employment service office. The main thing is that each employer must require a Statement of Availability from any man he hires.

Before you begin your 1944 canning, Good Housekeeping Magazine advises you: use the boiling-water bath method for tomatoes & fruits, only. Can all vegetables except tomatoes by the correct use of a pressure cooker to be sure of killing botulinus germs. In the last few years, cases of botulinus food poisoning have cropped up in widely different parts of the country.
