Down On Mac's Farm

Methods of Drying Up
of the Cow

It is desirable to dry up the cow at least a month before she again freshens. This gives nature an opportunity to prepare for the approaching birth. Furthermore, if the animal is continuously milked from one freshening period to the next, there is no opportunity for the secretion of colostrum.

The question frequently raised is how best to dry up, without danger, the cow that has quite a heavy milk flow as the termination of pregnancy approaches. Three methods are in use: (1) intermittent milking; (2) incomplete milking so as to gradually remove less and less; and (3) sudden cessation of milking. It is generally accepted that milk in the udder undergoing changes from the production to the drying up period is accompanied by an increase in numbers of germs. When the change has finally been made, the fluid in the udder more nearly compares to blood serum, and white blood cells, and it suppresses germ growth. With intermittent and incomplete milking as methods of drying up the cow, there is maintained in her udder conditions favorable for germ growth. Sudden cessation of milking soon sets up enough intramammary pressure to control secretion and then the changed character

of the fluid in the gland inhibits germ development.

To prevent undesirable sequelae in the drying up of a cow, it is best to reduce the amount of food permitted the animal, and to stop milking her. If this method seems to cause too much swelling and distress in an occasional animal, then it may be necessary to decrease the intramammary pressure by withdrawing some of the milk.

HOME CANNING IS EXPLAINED

When canning, homemakers are sometimes puzzled concerning the handling of jars of different types. It may be helpful to be able to recognize two distinct types of jar closures, which are handled by opposite methods.

The first class of jars has a separate rubber ring. This type of closure seals when the top is screwed down tightly. Since glass jars might break if sealed before processing, the lid of this type of closure is screwed only partly down before processing. That is, it is screwed down and back about a quarter of a turn. After processing, it is screwed completely down in order to complete the seal. One of these jars which has a separate ring has two wire balls. Before processing the smaller ball is left up. After processing, it is pushed down to complete the seal.

The other main type of closure is called self-seal. It has a metal lid edged with a sealing compound held in place by a metal screw band. This type of closure seals as it cools after processing. Screw the band firmly tight before processing this type of closure. Don't tighten this closure after processing.

Several explosions of jars occurred last summer because the new glass top jars with separate rubber rings were screwed down tight before processing, when they should have been turned back a quarter turn and tightened after processing. Also many people lost good food because they spoiled the seal of self-seal jars by tightening them after processing.
