STANFIELD BOY HAS MANY DUTIES

A Ninth Air Force Service Command Unit, European Theatre of Operations—Strafing supply arteries to check the flow of equipment to the Germans that oppose our armies now on French soil, the combat crews of the Ninth Air Force are bombarding all types of point-blank targets to smash von Runstedt's attempt to send reserves into the fray from behind the western wall. HUNTERS URGED TO FILE FOR TAGS

Hunters wishing to take part in any drawings for special cow elk and doe deer tags must have their applications on file at the Portland office of the State Game Commission not later than August 1. If at the end of that day's business, more applications are on hand than the number of tags to be issued, drawings will be held. In making application for these tags, a person should specify the type of tag desired and give his hunting license number if license has been purchased.

chased. No fee is to be remitted with applications.

There will be issued 3,000 doe deer tags for the open season October 1 to October 31 in the following area in Grant and Baker counties:

Beginning at Mt. Vernon; thence east along Highway No. 28 to the Unity reservoir; thence north along forest road through Whitney and Sumpter to Granite; thence north and west through Trout Meadows to the Forks Guard Station; thence west along Big Meadow Creek and the North Fork of the John Day river to Dale; thence south along Highway No. 395 to Mt. Vernon, the point of beginning.

For the Wenaha area in northeastern Oregon, 500 tags have been authorized for the taking of antlerless elk during the open season from November 1 to November 30.

The open area is as follows: Beginning at the Oregon-Washington line north of Milton, south on Highway No. 11 to Pendleton; thence south along Highway No. 30 to LaGrande; thence north along Highway No. 82 to Elgin; north from Elgin along the Grande Ronde river to the Washington state line and west along state line to the point of beginning.

RATIONING CALENDAR

PROCESSED FOODS—Book 4: Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5, valid indefinitely.

MEAT, BUTTER, FATS AND CHEESES—Book 4: Red stamps A8 through Z8 valid indefinitely.

SUGAR—Book 4: Sugar stamps 30, 31 and 32 valid indefinitely, five pounds each. For canning only: Sugar stamps 40 valid for 5 pounds. Apply at local OPA board for more.

SHOES — Loose stamps invalid.

Book 3: Airplane stamps Nos. 1 and 2 valid indefinitely.

GASOLINE COUPONS—Not valid unless endorsed. "A" No. 12 valid through September 21. 3 gallons each. "B3" or "C3" may be renewed within but not before 15 days from date on cover.

FUEL OIL—Period 45 coupons valid through September 30. Fill your tanks NOW!

TIRE INSPECTION — Records must be represented for gasoline renewals, special applications, and tire replacements.

STOVES—Apply at local OPA board or purchase certificates.

WOOD, COAL, SAWDUST—Order Now! Don't risk shortage next winter.

PRICE CONTROL—Refer inquiries and complaints to price clerk at local OPA board.
