ORDNANCE HAS NEW PROJECTILE

Army Ordnance has developed new invasion armor piercing projectiles that are 12 per cent better than those previously used against the enemy, according to Colonel Buyers, commanding the Umatilla Ordnance Depot.

This development occurred at a time when the steel industry's rolling capacity was taxed to the limit. However, through research and with the close cooperation of industry, Ordnance discovered that old-style shot could be reformed and converted into a new type projectile.

At the time this change occurred, the Ordnance Department, Army Service Forces had on hand 21,562,007 old-style projectiles ready for loading with explosives. In making the conversion to the new projectiles, 179,631,849 pounds of duo-alloy steel were salvaged and reused, thus saving many precious man-hours in the steel industry and giving our invasion forces greater firepower.

Taxpayers' savings were large. A saving of from an average of twenty-five cents on the 37 mm caliber projectile to an average of \$1.00 on the larger caliber projectiles was made in remachining the restruct forgings, as contrasted with the cost of the projectiles from new bar stock.

Book 4—Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5, valid indefinitely.
- MEAT, BUTTER, FATS AND CHEESES
Book 4—Red stamps A8 through Z8 valid indefinitely.
- SUGAR
Book 4—Sugar stamps 30, 31 and 32 valid indefinitely, 5 pounds each. For canning only—Sugar stamp 40 valid for 5 pounds. Apply at local OPA board for more.
- SHOES
Loose stamps invalid.
Book 3—Airplane stamps Nos. 1 and 2 valid indefinitely.
- GASOLINE COUPONS
Not valid unless endorsed.
"A" No. 12 valid through September 21, 3 gallons each.
"B3" or "C3" may be renewed within but not before 15 days from date on cover.
- FUEL OIL
Period 4-5 coupons valid through September 30. Fill your tanks NOW!
- TIRE INSPECTION
Records must be represented for gasoline renewals, special applications and tire replacements.
