The Mogul company operates a large fleet of tank trucks distributing gas, lubricating, fuel and diesel oil throughout Oregon, Idaho, Washington and part of Montana. There will be no storage at this station but it will be headquarters for service and repair work. The outfit moved here last week from Baker.
