September 21 is the last day for the present A book gasoline allotment. Renewal blanks are now available at all service stations, according to F. C. McKenzie, chief clerk of the local War Price and Rationing board. A book users are asked to get blanks at the service station, fill them out and mail them to the Hermiston board.

RETURNING VETS MAY MAKE LOANS

General eligibility requirements on the part of returning world war II veterans who wish Farm Security aid in re-establishing themselves on the farm, have been outlined by the County FSA Committee, reports Eugene Hampton, county FSA supervisor, Johns Building, Pendleton.

Loans up to \$2,500 for livestock, machinery, group services, building repair, cash rent, feed, seed, water facilities and other operating goods can be made to returning veterans who:

1. Have background of farming on their own or farm experience.
2. Have secure tenure on good family size farm through rent, lease purchase contract or ownership.

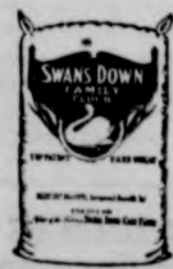
3. Are unable to secure adequate credit from local banks, PCA or similar agencies.

"The county committee which reviews and passes on applications will give special consideration to each veteran's application, but under present FSA authorities cannot give preference," said Hampton. "Loans are accompanied by management assistance where needed, bear five per cent interest and are generally repayable over a five year period. The average loan is around \$1,000 but can be higher where the farm and the veteran's experience justify it."

Present assistance in farm purchase under the Bankhead-Jones tenant act and provisions of the G. I. bill of rights will be announced as soon as details of administration are determined. Meanwhile every effort is being made by FSA to work closely with the county veterans' committees and interested groups in giving every possible aid.

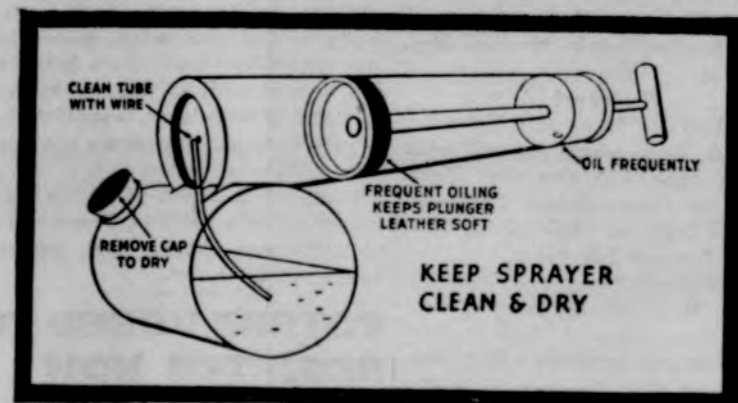
