ASSESSED VALUE OF COUNTY UP MILLION AND HALF

The assessed value of Umatilla county as of January 1, 1944, is \$49,178,808.32, which is an increase over the 1943 assessment of \$1,575,000.00, according to D. W. Davis, county assessor. Of this increase, \$765,000.00 is due to an increase in the Public Utility assessment, made by the State Tax Commission and \$809,000.00 is due to an increase in the local assessments made by the Assessor's office. The assessment of Public Utilities for the county is \$10,373,089.72 or about 20% of the assessed value of the county. The increase in the local assessment is due mostly to new buildings of various kinds.

While most taxing districts have an increase in valuation, a number of school districts and towns will have a slight increase in taxes due to a larger budget for 1944-45 taxes.

The county millage for the 1944-45 tax is 6.8 mills which is a decrease of 2 tenths of a mill under the preceding year, caused by the increase in assessed value of the county.

Umatilla county will receive approximately \$144,000.00 from the State School Support Fund which is distributed among the school districts on the basis of their daily attendance. In some school districts, the amount received from this source has eliminated the school tax altogether while others have had their taxes substantially lowered. Following are a few of the amounts that school districts will receive from this source: Echo district, \$3,300.00; Umatilla district, \$4,200.00; Weston district, \$2,100.00; Athena district, \$2,900.00; Milton-Freewater district, \$12,000.00; Stan-

field district, \$7,700.00; Pendleton district, \$43,000.00, and of course all other school districts which have a tax levy. The Union High districts will also receive some of this money in various amounts. The Milton-Freewater Union High district will receive \$9,800.00 and the Hermiston Union High district \$6,600.00, to mention a couple.

The total tax for the City of Pendleton will have a slight increase in millage over the preceding year due to a slight increase in both the city and school budgets. However, since the City of Pendleton has an increase in assessed value of \$162,300.75, the increase in millage is held down to four tenths of one mill.

The City of Hermiston will have a millage of 25.8 which is 2.4 mills lower than last year, due to a decrease in county and city millage.

The Federal Housing projects are not, as many people suppose, exempt from taxes. While they are not made a part of the county assessment roll, a value is placed on them comparable to other property, assessed in the county and the U. S. Government pays to the different taxing districts in which these projects are located, a sum equal to that which would be levied against the property were they placed on the assessment roll. There are three of these projects in Umatilla county located at Sergeant City, Hermiston and the town of Ordinance.
