RATIONING CALENDAR

PROCESSED FOODS—(On September 17 all point values to be removed except for canned fruits, canned juices, canned tomatoes, catsup and chili sauce.) Book 4: Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through L5 valid indefinitely. Blue tokens to be discontinued October 1 and accepted only in multiples of 10 between September 17-30. Retailers will not give in change after September 17. Use all you have before October 1.

MEAT, BUTTER, CHEESE—Book 4: Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through G5 valid indefinitely. Spare stamp 25 good for 10 points lamb only through October 21.

SUGAR—Book 4: Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33 valid indefinitely. 5 pounds each. Sugar stamp 40 valid through February 28, 1945. For 5 pounds home canning only. For more canning sugar, apply local board, using spare stamp 37.

SHOES—Loose stamps invalid. Book 3: Airplane stamps 1 and 2 valid indefinitely.

GASOLINE COUPONS—Not valid unless endorsed. "A" No. 12 valid through September 21. "A" No. 13 valid September 22. Apply by mail to local boards at once for renewal, attaching back cover of "A" book, and tire inspection record. Blanks available at service stations.

STOVES—(Rationing of coal and wood heating and cooking stoves to end October 15.) Apply at local OPA board for purchase certificates.
