### ORDNANCE DEPOT HIGH IN SAFETY

The Safety Section of the Umatilla Ordnance Depot takes pride in announcing that the lowest frequency rate in the history of the depot was achieved in the month of August, justly credited to intensified efforts and increasing momentum in safety consciousness among all employees of the depot.

The new all time low accident rate of 7.5 per million man hours of exposure in the month of August with only two lost time accidents, which is 2.1 below the rate established from January through June 1944, by Ordnance installations performing similar duties, places the depot in a most favorable position in the 1944-45 Ordnance Safety Contest already in progress since July 1, 1944, running through June 30, 1945.

That the Umatilla Ordnance Depot Accident Prevention program has progressively reduced the frequency of lost time accidents is reflected in the following frequency rates:

Average frequency rate, 1942, 86.6.  
Average frequency rate 1943, 41.06.  
Average frequency rate first 6 mo. 1944, 23.7.  
Average frequency rate July and August, 1944, 9.6.
