Oregon's first big game season of this year opens for antelope on September 24 and will extend through October 7. Plenty of antelope tags are still available for sale at the Portland office of the Game Commission, the fees being \$2.50 for residents and \$5 for non-residents. In making application for a tag, a person should forward the correct fee and information as to the number and kind of hunting license held.

All of the antelope range is open to hunting with certain exceptions. The Drakes Flat area and the Millican-Fort Rock-Wagontire area closed.
