The Umatilla county grand jury last week returned a not true bill in the case of Francis Angus Flynn 39, former truck foreman at the Umatilla Ordnance Depot. He had been charged with second degree murder in connection with the killing July 2 here of Ronald Lee Coffman of Hanford, Wash. The action of the grand jury clears the slate for Flynn, who has been out on bail for some time.

Flynn maintained that the shooting of Coffman was done in self defense. It was the outgrowth of a party at Flynn's home that night.

At the start of the second quarter the Cardinal eleven started a drive which went to the four yard line where beautiful line play by the Bulldogs stopped them cold and Hermiston kicked out. Neither team got close to the goal line for the remainder of the quarter and the ball was in Bulldog possession as the half gun sounded.

The third quarter was still favoring Waitsburg. Things started off with Hermiston receiving and running the ball to midfield. Matott hit the line for nine yards and Williams made a first down off tackle. A pass, good for 15 yards, Belt to Wilcox, was nullified because of an offside and after two plays into the line, Schoonover again dropped back and kicked. At this point the Cardinals made another drive to the Hermiston 10 yard line, only to lose the ball on downs. The end of the third quarter found Waitsburg deep in their own territory—4th and 10.

The fourth quarter really found things happening. The Bulldogs blocked a Waitsburg punt and Harkenrider recovered the ball. After two plays around end, Belt heaved a pass to Harkenrider for the first touchdown. Williams converted on a line smash and Hermiston led 7-0.

The Cardinals elected to receive but when the ball was kicked short and fumbled, Johnson and Hughes recovered for the Bulldogs. Matott took an end sweep good for eight yards to the Waitsburg 40 and Williams followed with an off tackle slant for nine more. At this point Schoonover took a straight buck into the line, kept his feet, and dodged and weaved 31 yards to goal territory. The conversion was good on a pass to Wilcox and the Bulldogs led 14 to 0.

Waitsburg again received and this time an intercepted pass gave the ball to Hermiston at midfield. An end run was stopped for no gain but a pass to Wilcox was good for 20 yards. Williams, Matott and Schoonover carried the ball in that order to the 12 yard line where a pass, this time Belt to Matott, was good for another six points. The kick for conversion was wide, leaving the score 20-0. The game ended with both teams substituting freely.

Outstanding for the locals was the line work which, after the first quarter, was decidedly better than would be expected of a line outweighed nearly 15 pounds to the man. Probably the outstanding runner of the afternoon was Matott, while Schoonover kicked far above average. Not to be overlooked was B. Jensen, stellar center, who didn't make a bad pass all afternoon. All in all the team played good ball and deserves much credit.
