Despite close range machine-gun fire which wounded 20 of his men, Major Elterich directed the infantrymen, burdened with heavy equipment, to a path up the bank. His action helped materially to reduce casualties, the war department said.

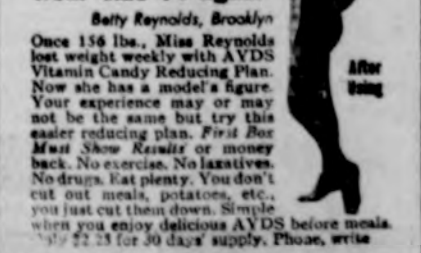
