ECHO NEWS ITEMS

Harold Liesegang, navy storekeeper 3/c, arrived Monday on an embarkation furlough from his station at Oakland, Calif. He is a member of an advance base unit which has the duty of installing supply bases in territory taken over from the enemy. His leave expires October 15.

The first deer of the season reported brought in was a two point buck killed by Earl Bangs in the district near the head of Butter Creek. A party consisting of Joe Middleton, Tom Loyd, Ray Tolar and Earl Bangs went from here and were joined in the mountains by Wm. Bohms, E. J. Nieland and Arlie Dabney. They returned Sunday evening, Bangs being the only one of the group to bag a deer.

A letter from T/5 John Stephen Spike, Echo postmaster, says that he is now on postal duty in France. He says his billet is not so bad. He and another buddy have rustled boards enough for a tent foundation and bed, and as soon as the structure is completed plan to have a house warming party with K rations as refreshments.

John Young was quite seriously ill Tuesday and was reported threatened with pneumonia.

Mrs. Nona H. McFaul has received word of her appointment as acting postmaster at Echo, to serve during the absence of Postmaster John S. Spike in the military service. The appointment was made September 27.

Mrs. Kenneth Bowman and two children left this week for an extended visit with Mr. Bowman, who is on shore duty in the Oregon coast district.

Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Dick of Nolin attended the funeral in Pendleton Tuesday of James Enright, age 84, who died in the Pendleton hospital Saturday. Mr. Enright was a grandfather of Mr. Dick and resided with him at Nolin for several years. He was a pioneer of the Albee neighborhood and interment was in the Albee cemetery.

Col. Robert E. Jarmon of Echo has been named chief of the ATSC armament laboratory at Wright Field, Ohio, it is announced by command headquarters. Col. Jarmon, a career officer, began service as a flying cadet in July, 1931, after graduating from Oregon State college as an electrical engineer. Upon completion of flight training at Randolph, March and Kelly fields, he served as engineer officer at Luke Field, Hawaii, until February, 1934. He then began a period of inactive duty as a reserve officer, during which time he flew various western air mail routes. In July, 1935, he was commissioned in the regular army and assigned to Hamilton Field, Calif. In 1938 he returned to Hawaii where he served as chief inspector at the Hawaiian air depot. He went to Wright Field and was assigned to the armament laboratory in November 1940. Col. Jarmon was reared at Butter Creek where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Jarmon had a ranch. He attended the Pine City and Echo schools before going to Oregon State. He is married and has two children.

Miss Martha Freeman of Spokane, who has been teaching the 7th and 8th grades at Echo school, resigned Wednesday and left that day for her home. Mrs. H. Cleaver of La Grande has been employed to succeed Miss Freeman.

Membership in the student body organization of Echo high school is 100 per cent this year. This is the first time a full membership has been reached in many years, according to the records.

Members of the Senior class pleasantly surprised Mrs. Wilcox, high school teacher of last year, with a shower party Tuesday evening.

Bill Esselstyn brought in the largest buck seen in these parts for many seasons Monday, a four-point deer with a horn spread of 33 inches and weighing 220 pounds dressed. Each member of the party of five, killed a deer but C. H. Esselstyn had bad luck with his. A cougar got at the animal while Esselstyn went for help to pack it out and ate most of the fore quarters. The party, consisting of C. H. Esselstyn, Bill Esselstyn, Marvin Laughlin, John Grossmiller and John Dabney, hunted in the Wal-lowa country.
