RATIONING CALENDAR

Processed Foods—Blue stamps A8 through Z3 and A5 through R5 valid indefinitely.

Meat, Butter, Cheese—Book 4: Red stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through K5 valid indefinitely. Book 4: Spare stamp 25 good for 10 points lamb only through October 21.

Sugar—Book 4: Sugar stamps 30-31-32-33 valid indefinitely, 5 pounds each. Sugar stamp 40 valid through February 28, 1945, for 5 pounds home canning only. For more canning sugar, apply local board using spare stamp 37.

Shoes—Loose stamps invalid. Book 3: Airplane stamps 1-2 valid indefinitely. New stamp valid November 1.

Gasoline Coupons—Endorse new coupons before using. "A" 13 expires December 21. Each coupon worth 4 gallons.

Stoves—(Rationing of coal, wood stoves ends October 15.) Apply local board for purchase certificates.

Wood, Coal, Sawdust—Delivery by priorities based on written statement of needs.
