Several house slippers have also been made but are being held for the time being for samples. House slippers are easily made of scrap cotton materials but are done on sewing machines. Due to lack of machines, not as many people can work on slippers and other machine-made articles. The two machines at the USO club are being put to good use and are greatly appreciated.

Several more robes are nearing completion and will be shipped soon. Many contributions for scrap woolen goods are coming in now for robes. A need for these is anticipated all winter.

Mrs. Spencer wishes to thank the Girl Scout groups and their leaders who are aiding in these projects. Two groups, led by Mrs. T. J. Means and Mrs. J. A. Shaw, are each making a complete robe. **COUNTY RACES DRAW ATTENTION**

This week's Herald looks more like the Voters Pamphlet and no doubt next week's issue will be quite similar, but readers are informed that the general election comes November 7 and everything will go back to normal. There has been some misunderstanding as to voting hours which will be from 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

Local politics came to life this week when candidates made known their intentions to run for office. The list is headed by F. C. McKenzie, perennial Hermiston mayor. Others are Charles Taylor, recorder, and Florine Langenwaller, treasurer. Four holdover councilmen have filed their intentions to run, including George Harkenrider, J. G. Pearson, A. F. Rohman and W. W. Felthouse. Two other petitions have been filed with the city recorder for Sam Moore and R. C. McReynolds. Several more have indicated their desire to run for council and no doubt their petitions will be filed either today (Thursday) or prior to 5:00 o'clock Friday, the closing hour for filing.

County politics are rather tame except for two positions. W. P. Graham, republican, is attempting to overthrow the regime of the veteran R. E. Goad, democrat, for the position of county sheriff. Although the contest was slow in developing, the last few days has seen both candidates on local streets shaking hands with would-be voters.

The other contest is between W. R. Nugent, retired railroad engineer of Umatilla, and Wm. R. Meiners who has served for many years as county commissioner. Mr. Nugent is staging a concentrated campaign for the job and is stressing the fact that he has had many years of experience in road and street building, prior to becoming a railroad engineer. He has been a resident of Umatilla county for 29 years. Mr. Meiners is stressing the fact that his many years of faithful service warrants another term of office. This will probably be decided by a close vote.

National and state politics are now in the home stretch and newspapers and radios are attempting to keep the campaign before the public. Luke warm voters are coming to life and even the most disinterested voter of recent weeks is now beginning to ask, "Who's running against who?"

**LOCAL MAN WINS BRONZE MEDAL**

Word has been received from Washington that 1st Lt. Walter J. Jendrzejewski of Hermiston has been awarded the bronze star medal for action at Humboldt bay, Dutch New Guinea, last April.

According to information received, a blown-out bridge forced Lt. Jendrzejewski to leave his vehicle and proceed through hostile territory with only two men. "Due to his activities and devotion to duty his battalion was able to advance the following morning to new positions which he had located," the war department reported.
