MORE POWER IS REPORTED USED

A 20 per cent increase in consumption of electricity by Pacific Power & Light Company's general customers, and a 13 per cent decrease in the average price per kilowatt-hour, in the 12 months ended September 30 was reported by Paul B. McBee, president, in his quarterly letter sent to preferred stockholders today.

"The average residential customer used 104 kilowatt-hours more electricity in the 12-month period, and paid the company \$1.31 less in revenue," said McBee.

"The average price received for this service was only 1.86 cents per kilowatt-hour, a drop of 0.17 cents as compared with the preceding period.

"The company's tax bill of \$1,187,485, on the other hand, was up \$33,087, or 2.9 per cent, in spite of reduced earnings.

BULLDOGS WIN OVER VISITORS

Displaying what seemed to be their best form of the season, the Hermiston high school Bulldogs trounced the Kennewick Lions last Friday on the local field to the tune of 27-7. The Bulldogs displayed too much power via the air lanes for the bigger Kennewick boys to cope with. After spotting them to seven points in the initial three minutes, the local Bulldogs came back to score in every quarter of the game.

The Lions won the toss and elected to receive. After being held for downs, Kauth, Kennewick back, kicked out of bounds on the Hermiston 16 where the Bulldogs fumbled on the first play and Kennewick recovered. Three plays later they crashed to a touchdown with Adams carrying the ball. Kauth's kick for the extra point

was good and the Lions had a 7-0 lead.

Hermiston ran back the kickoff to midfield where they started their first drive. With Matott, Williams and Belt toting the ball, the Bulldogs worked to the Kennewick 18 where a pass from Bill Schoonover to Glenn Wilcox was completed on the five and Wilcox scampered over unmolested. The conversion came on an end run with Belt lugging the ball.

The quarter ended as Hermiston kicked off and the Lions ran back to their own forty. The second quarter progressed with a kicking duel between Schoonover of Hermiston and Kauth of Kennewick, with neither team wishing to take chances. Finally, with 10 seconds to go, the Kennewick center lofted the ball over Adams' head and Buell recovered for the Bulldogs. With but time for one play, Schoonover heaved a long pass to Belt on the Kennewick 10 and the latter galloped over for another tally. The try for point failed and the halftime score was 13-7.

The third quarter opened with the Bulldogs receiving and pounding the ball to the visitors' 30. A pass to Harkenrider was completed to the two yard line and after an unsuccessful try at the line, Matott skirted left end for a tally. The conversion was good with Williams going off tackle.

The start of the fourth quarter found both teams bolstering new squads who fought on even terms at midfield. The highlight of the game came with only six seconds left in the game when Follett, sub Hermiston back, intercepted a Lion pass and outran the entire Lion team, 60 yards to pay dirt. A beautiful block by Wilcox eliminated two would-be tacklers, and Follett ran unmolested. Rowell

converted and the game ended 27 to 7 in the favor of Hermiston.

The team as a whole looked better than usually, especially on pass plays. Special credit must be given, however, to the Hermiston line. The forward wall was one of the best that Hermiston has fielded in recent years and gave the Bulldog backs time to run and pass as they pleased.
