NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the City of Umatilla, Oregon, on the 7th day of November, 1944, for the

purpose of voting upon the adoption or rejection of the following proposed amendments to the Charter of the City of Umatilla, Oregon, proposed by resolution of the Common Council of said city.

To amend Section 2, Chapter 1 of the City of Umatilla, Oregon, by including within, annexing to and extending the boundaries of said city to include the following described tract, to-wit:

The exterior boundaries of which are described as follows: From a point 1563.95 ft. South 0° 47' East from the 1/4 corner common to Sections 8 and 17, Township 5 North, Range 28, E. W. M., Umatilla County, Oregon, which point is the intersection of the North and South center line of said Section 17 and the center line of Sixth Street in the City of Umatilla, Oregon; thence North 0° 47' West along said North and South center line 210.11 to the O. W. R. & N. right of way; thence North 84° 08' East 1283.7 ft.; thence on a 6° 24' curve right a distance of 1175.0 feet; thence on a tangent bearing South 3° 06' East along the Westerly O. W. R. & N. right of way line a distance of 605.7 ft., more or less, to a point 200.0 ft. North of the East-West center line of said Section 17; thence West 388 ft. to a point 796 ft. West and 200.0 ft. North of the 1/4 corner common to Sections 16 and 17; thence North 114.2 ft.; thence West 1850.5 ft. to the North and South center line of said Section 17; thence North 0° 47' West along the said North and South center line 778.53 ft. to the point of beginning, and

The electors of the City of Umatilla are hereby invited to vote upon such proposition by placing upon their ballots the words "for annexation" or "against annexation" or words equivalent thereto.

Said election will be held at the Community Hall, Umatilla, Oregon, between 8:00 A. M. and 8:00 P. M. of said day in the City of Umatilla, Oregon, at the same time

and place within said city as the general election now provided for by law to be held on said date throughout the state, using the same election officers and machinery.
