SUNDAY CLUB TO PRESENT PICTURE

The Sunday Evening club of the Methodist church presents this Sunday night, November 12, at 8 p. m., one of the most thrilling of travel pictures, "Wheels Across India", a sound motion picture, filmed by the Denis-Roosevelt Asiatic expedition. Here, indeed, is a fascinating pictorial account of wonders of the desert, animal life, weird rituals and strange customs as practiced in many outposts of the world.

Sights never seen before except by very few persons pass in procession as the film unrolls. Men in India eat glass; others pierce their bodies with hundreds of silver-tipped spears and brave self-tortures to atone for their sins. There are views of the Ganges where living and dead mingle in ceremonial rites along the river bank.

Capture of wild elephants to be trained for work shows unarmed hunters risking their lives to rope a prospective worker.

But the thrill of all thrills in this stirring film is the ceremony in which a Burmese priestess kisses a deadly king cobra three times to complete the snake god ritual.

Also of great interest are the Burmese Inthas who row their tree-hewn 60-foot canoes with their legs instead of their arms. Conrad Nagel is narrator of the picture.
