SCHOLARSHIP TO E.O.C. TO BE GIVEN

Eastern Oregon College—A gift of a \$74.00 all-tuition freshman scholarship for 1945-46 to Eastern Oregon College at La Grande by the Senior High School class of Irrigon, was acknowledged as the first of its kind by Dr. Roben J. Maaske, president of the college. The scholarship will be awarded at Commencement in May to the most worthy Irrigon high school senior, chosen by the teachers and seniors at Irrigon next spring. The fund was raised by a basket social sponsored by the Irrigon High School seniors recently, under the leadership of Edward C. Elliott, superintendent.

SKIDDING CAUSE MANY ACCIDENTS

Motor vehicle accidents involving skidding show an upward trend at this time of year when many city streets are covered with wet, fallen leaves, according to Robert S. Farrell, secretary of state.

Farrell urged motorists to recognize the hazard caused by pavements covered with slippery leaves and to drive accordingly. Sudden application of brakes while driving over wet leaves, or sudden turns will throw a vehicle into what may be a dangerous skid, he said.

Slippery leaves constitute one of the serious winter-time driving hazards that often lead to accidents when drivers fail to take them into account in their driving practices, Farrell said.
