COUNTY LEAGUE MAKES CHANGES IN COURT SLATE

The much talked of change in the B school league circles of this area has finally been announced. Hereafter the Umatilla county league will consist of eight teams, not including Umatilla which will remain in the Little Wheat league which is composed of Ione, Umatilla, Boardman, Irrigon and Heppner, which before now was not a member.

In the changed boundaries, Echo and Stanfield are connected with the Umatilla county league for the first time. Other six teams are Helix, Adams, Weston, Athena, Pilot Rock and Umapine. Apportionment of teams in the sub-district basketball tournament to be held at John Day this year has also been completed. The Umatilla county group will send three teams and the Little Wheat league two, while the host team is seeded and the Grant county teams will send two teams to make up the eight.

Daniel W. Bowman
Funeral services for Daniel W. Bowman were held at the Echo church Monday afternoon, with Rev. Earl B. Cotton in charge. Mrs. Warren Center, accompanied by Miss Cotton on the piano, sang three solos. Honorary pallbearers were Joseph Cunha, Fred W. Andrews, J. F. Spinning, Edw. Liesegang, Jake Rueber, F. J. Irvine, Milt Whitmore and John Luciani. Acting pallbearers were Murl Berry, C. H. Esselstyn, Fred Rauch, Ben Gaskill, Tom Graves and Nick Timehek.

Mr. Bowman died at the Pendleton hospital Friday. He had been ill for some time and last week his condition became critical and he was taken to the hospital suffering from a heart attack.

Daniel Webster Bowman was born December 31, 1872, at Olaneta, Pa. He was married to Miss Hannah Barnett at Madera, Pa., in June, 1894, and they came to Umatilla county soon afterward. He worked for a while at the Corral ranch on Butter Creek and then acquired a farm just north of Echo where the family has since resided, with the exception of a few years when he managed an auto camp at Santa Monica, Cal., for his brother, Commodore P. Bowman, now deceased. Mr. Bowman was an artist and devoted much of his spare time to making pen and ink sketches some of which won awards at various exhibitions.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Hannah Bowman of Echo; two daughters, Mrs. Gertrude Gordon

of Kelso, Wn., and Mrs. Esther Fife of Nyssa; and three sons, Asa and Homer of Echo, and Kenneth, now stationed in the navy at Pacific Beach, Wash. Of a family of 15 children only four of Mr. Bowman's brothers and sisters are now living, Sam of Clearfield, Pa.; Paul of Compton, Calif.; and Mrs. Lucy Withrow and Julia Owens of Olaneta, Pa.

Easy to bake for Holiday eating

THE HOLIDAY season is "just around the corner" and now is the time to think about the good things we can bake—good things to top off any fine dinner! For example, a fruit cake or a special pie or a holiday pudding.

DARK FRUIT CAKE
1 cup enriched flour
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 tsp. cloves
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
4 eggs
2 cups seedless raisins
1/2 cup thinly sliced citron
1/2 cup thinly sliced candied orange peel
1/2 cup chopped nuts, meats, peanuts, walnuts, pecans, etc.

Sift and measure flour, sift again with spices and salt. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, creaming until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flour mixture gradually, combining thoroughly. Fold in fruits and nuts; mix. Pour into loaf pan (8x5 1/2x3) lined first with well-greased manila, then waxed paper. Bake in slow oven (275° F.) 2 1/4 hours or until done. Makes 1 loaf.

Note: Cake is the "quick-baking" type. May be stored for only a few weeks.
