a great volume of wheat which will eventually be placed under loan in this county. Therefore, in the interests of better service to each applicant, the County Committee chairman asks that sufficient time be allowed for the preparation of the loans to insure their execution before the deadline on December 31, 1944.

Regardless of date of application interest on these notes does not begin until the date of disbursement by the lending agency; hence nothing is to be gained by postponement of date of application. In the case of farm-stored wheat, after application is received by the local office, time must be allowed for measurement of bins, and sampling and inspection of grain, before the loan papers can be prepared. Due to the emergencies of war, the county office is operating with a minimum number of employees and it is hoped that cooperation who are anticipating taking advantage of the opportunities offered by the Commodity Credit Corporation loan this year.

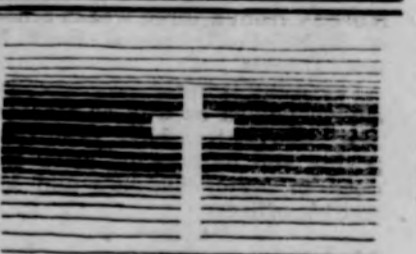
ECHO NEWS ITEMS
