**COUNTY TO AID
 MEMORIAL FUND
 FOR PROF. HYSLOP**

Cash donations of various denominations are continuing to come in for the George R. Hyslop, Agricultural Research Memorial, according to Lowell Steen and Emil Zivney, co-chairmen for soliciting in Umatilla county. Able assistants, members of the county committee for this west end, include C. E. Fisk, John Jendrzewski, L. A. McClintock, Floyd McDonald, H. J. Ott and Ralph Saylor.

"Professor George R. Hyslop gave a unique service to Umatilla county and the other Columbia Basin wheat counties", said Lowell Steen of Milton, who, with Emil Zivney of Stanfield is co-chairman of the Hyslop Memorial Fund Committee, today. "When he arrived in Oregon he found the county growing 15 or 20 varieties of wheat and they were all badly mixed. In fact, about 40 per cent of the wheat of the county was discounted in price in those days because of mixture. The discounts usually ran from 3 cents per bushel up to as much as 10 cents per bushel. "Prof." devised a system of seed certification by which he examined the fields, picked out the cleanest seed, and classed it as certified. This was the first time grain seed was certified in the United States, and since then every other state in the Union uses the same method of field inspection that he thought up about 30 years ago. He deserves national recognition as the founder of certified seed.

"He also attacked the variety tangle and through this certification program the county's varieties were standardized so that for years 2 or 3 varieties made up the bulk of the county's wheat, and discounts because of mixture dropped to almost zero. The elimination of mixtures in the county easily was worth over \$25,000 per year for a period of the past 30 years.

"In Umatilla county, when the bulk system was threatened by a suit claiming that bulk handling had reduced the value of seed grain, "Prof." left his class rooms to testify for the elevators, and it was his testimony that succeeded in voiding the suit. This is only one of hundreds of incidents in connection with early day grain marketing fights where George Hyslop always fought on the farmers' side. Old timers will remember about the "Tri-State Terminal Company" and its efforts to break into grain marketing. A few will remember in the first war how "Prof." worked with farm organizations in an effort to get the set prices for wheat on the Pacific coast raised up to a fair basis as compared with Chicago. This fight led over the head of the grain administrator and direct to President Wilson. It was successful.

"Hyslop was also the man behind the establishment of the Moro and Pendleton experiment stations and he helped to lay out the work there that eventually developed practically all of the wheat varieties that are in use now in Eastern Oregon.

"All over the Columbia Basin are men now farming who went to

school to "Prof." and he fills a greater and greater part of their memories as a kind, human, understanding friend."
