AUXILIARY NEWS NOTES

The Sixth District Conference of the American Legion Auxiliary was held Monday, December 4th, in the Vert Memorial in Pendleton with representatives from most of the units of the district in attendance. The conference was conducted by Mrs. Helen Belt of Hermiston, president of the district, who introduced Mrs. Gladys Lemons, Pendleton, president of the Department of Oregon; Mrs. Dorothy Templar, Klamath Falls, Department First Vice President; Mrs. Mae Whitcomb, Portland, Department Secretary; Mrs. Effie Ritchie, Milton, Department Chaplain, and Mrs. Clara Scott, Milton, Oregon's representative to the Veterans' Hospital in Walla Walla. The morning session was devoted to reports of the units, followed by the introduction of Cpl. Morgan of the WAC who showed a film depicting the need of WAC's for the medical department. The meeting was recessed for lunch furnished by the entertaining unit of Pendleton.

The afternoon session was entirely given over to talks and reports by the department officers. Mrs. Scott reported that there are about 80 Oregon men in the Walla Walla hospital, half at least being veterans of the present war. She stressed the fact that families of tubercular patients should insist upon their staying in the hospital until the doctor in charge gives permission to go home. Great damage is done and recovery is retarded if the patient leaves too soon and then finds that he must return for further treatment. Mrs. Belt was accompanied to Pendleton by Mrs. Jeannette Sa-

boe, president of the Hermiston unit. The American Legion Auxiliary is having a special meeting Friday evening at 8:00 to wrap the gifts donated for the "Christmas Gifts for the Yanks Who Gave" program. A short business meeting will be held to dispose of necessary business so as to leave the regular meeting free for our Christmas party.

The annual Christmas party with the Legion will be held Wednesday, December 13th, and instead of the usual 25c gift exchange each person attending is asked to bring a package of cigarettes, later to be sent to the Veterans' hospital in Walla Walla. The evening will be spent in games, singing and a war bond will be auctioned. Bring your nickels as the auction is that kind.

HERMISTON ROD & GUN CLUB TO SPONSOR CONTEST

With an intensive campaign for a sign-up of local sportsmen in the newly organized Hermiston Rod & Gun club, which will sponsor a magpie control program in the west end of the county, it seems possible that a very successful plan may be outlined for the coming year. It is said that between \$200 and \$300 will be needed to put the plan in effect.

It is planned to offer a large list of valuable prizes with a top of around \$50 for the largest number of magpies brought in during the coming year. The contest will be

open to everybody in this territory and will be conducted along the lines of the 1939 campaign. Points will be given on the old birds, young birds and eggs.

In addition to the gun club, the granges, Farm Bureau, turkey and poultry men will assist in financing the program. The magpie menace has grown in large proportions and during the past summer more magpies than ever before have been noted with much damage to game birds as well as domestic fowls.

The Rod & Gun club was reorganized last week with Frank Bildeback as president and Frank G. Hackler secretary. It is planned to hold another meeting this month when Harold Dobyns is expected to be here addressing the meeting and showing an interesting film. The date will be announced upon completion of arrangements.

Cooky and candy making

TIME TO start thinking about those holiday "goodies"! And here are two examples of how easy it is to turn those thoughts into delicious things-to-eat:

- GINGERBREAD MEN**
- 3 cups enriched flour
 - 3 tps. baking powder
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1/2 tsp. ginger
 - 1/3 cup shortening
 - 1/3 cup brown sugar firmly packed
 - 2/3 cup dark molasses
 - 1 egg
- Sift and measure flour; sift again with baking powder, salt, and ginger. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add molasses and unbeaten egg; beat well. Add flour mixture gradually, mixing well after each addition. Roll on slightly floured board to 1/2-inch thickness. Cut with floured gingerbread-man cutter or cut a large square for the body, smaller circle for the head, and strips for the arms and legs. Place on lightly greased cookie or baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) until done, 10 to 12 minutes. Remove cookies immediately to rack; cool; store. Makes about 4 doz. 2-inch cookies or 6 large 10-inch gingerbread men.

- TURKISH DELIGHT**
- 3 tbsps. unflavored gelatin
 - 1/2 cup cold water
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 1/2 cup hot water
 - 2 tbsps. orange juice
 - 1 tbsp. grated orange or lemon rind
 - 8 drops yellow vegetable coloring
 - 2 tbsps. lemon juice
 - 1 tbsp. grated orange or lemon rind
 - 8 drops yellow vegetable coloring
- Soften gelatin in cold water. Combine sugar and hot water in saucepan and stir well until sugar is dissolved. Bring to boil; add softened gelatin and cook slowly for 20 minutes. Remove from heat and add orange and lemon juice, grated rind, and coloring. Pour to about 1-inch thickness into shallow pan (4x10) which has been rinsed with cold water. Let stand overnight; turn out on board lightly sprinkled with powdered sugar; cut in one-inch cubes and roll in powdered sugar. Makes about 40 cubes.
