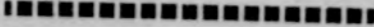

TURKEY PICKING
ENDS THIS WEEK

Picking at the local plant of the Eastern Oregon Tukey Growers will probably end Saturday night, states John Jendrzewski, president. The packing crew will probably have to work Monday to complete operations.

Mrs. Julia Penney, secretary, stated Wednesday that the seventh car was being loaded that day. In addition, about three car loads have been sold from the plant, making about ten carloads of turkeys processed here to date.

This will conclude operations until December 27, according to Mr. Jendrzewski.

Scrapbooks Available

You too, in your own home, can help bring cheer to men in hospitals, who are recovering from overseas injuries. Don't waste a moment to do your bit. Get yourself a USO scrapbook and spend the coming winter evenings clipping and pasting together these compact carriers of reading entertainment. While doing a worthwhile war service, you will spend many enjoyable hours. Even in camps and hospitals where there is an abundance of reading material (and there are places where there isn't) the USO scrapbook, because of its individuality and originality, brings untold pleasure to our hospitalized men.

Complete directions for making are on the inside covers. Put thought and care into the compiling of each book, so it will withstand long usage. USO scrapbooks are 15c, which covers cost, tax and mailing.

Call your neighbors and friends now. You may wish to organize a little USO-Scrapbook club in your community. When completed, your books will go to military hospitals in this area and overseas to our fighting men on every battle front. Books can be secured from your local USO club. You may just phone or write to USO Club and books will be sent upon receipt of a prepaid amount.

This is a war service you will really enjoy. By clipping to the center of interest you can get 250 to 300 cartoons in one USO scrapbook. Short stories from a number of magazines can be cut to fit into one of these lightweight durable little books. Pool your magazines with your neighbors, so as to get two copies of each issue and then clip serials from eight or ten issues of current magazines and paste them into a USO scrapbook.

Letters of appreciation are received daily at the National Headquarters in Berkeley. Mrs. Walter Kolasa, national director, says: "Every man, woman and child could be helping with this war effort. If they only realized the pleasure they would get and give from making these scrapbooks."

He tells us our national organization is preparing to use every strategy and legitimate force to get the present Congress to act favorably.

PHONE COMPANY PAYS DIVIDEND

A dividend of \$1.50 per share on preferred stock and \$1.75 on common stock was declared December 7 by directors of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, according to announcement by N. R. Powley, president, received by A. M. Green, local manager. The preferred dividend is payable January 15 to shareholders of record December 30 and the common dividend is payable December 30 to shareholders of record December 18.
