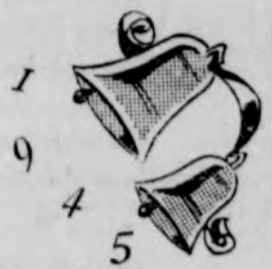
With 1945 about to make its debut, we can think of nothing more appropriate than that time-honored greeting, Happy New Year!

John Eichner, do	150.20	Gasoline Coupons —Not valid unless endorsed. "A" 13 expires December 21. Each coupon worth 4 gallons.	
John Bunch, do	194.15	Stoves —Apply local board for purchase certificates for oil, gas stoves.

Frank McRoberts, do	183.53	Fuel Oil —Period 4 and 5 coupons (1943-44 series) and period 1 and 2 coupons (1944-45 series) valid through August 31, 1945. Not more than 27 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.
