Doris Wilson shopped in The Dalles Monday.

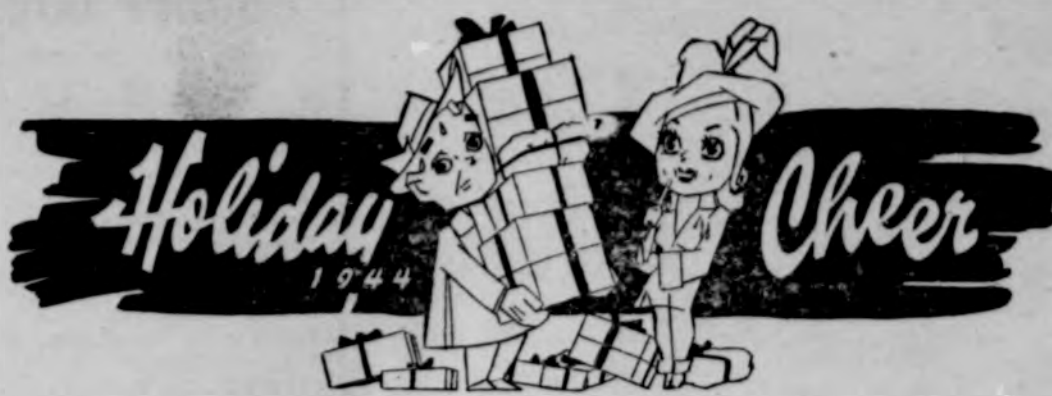
Mrs. Tyler is convalescing at home after returning from the Ordnance hospital Tuesday.
