RATIONING CALENDAR

Processed Foods—Book 4: Blue stamps X5 through Z5, and A2 to G2 valid indefinitely. Destroy A8 through Z8 and A5 through W5.

Meat, Butter, Cheese — Book 4: Red stamps Q5 through X5 valid indefinitely. Destroy A8 through Z8 and A5 through P5.

Sugar—Book 4: Sugar stamp 34 valid indefinitely, 5 pounds. Destroy sugar stamps 30, 31, 32 & 33.

Shoes—Loose stamps invalid. Book 3: Airplane stamps 1-2-3 valid indefinitely.

Gasoline Coupons — Not valid unless endorsed. "A" 14 expires March 21, 1945. Each coupon worth 4 gallons.

Stoves—Apply local board for oil, gas stove certificates.

Wood, Coal, Sawdust—Delivery by priorities based on needs.

Fuel Oil—Period 4 and 5 coupons (1943-44 series) and period 1 and 2 coupons (1944-45 series) valid through August 31, 1945. Not more than 36 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.

Price Control—Refer inquiries and complaints to price clerk at local board.
