ENUMERATORS ARE NEEDED FOR FARM CENSUS

The Bureau of the Census which is going to start enumeration of all farms for the regular 5 year survey is encountering difficulty in securing sufficient help in Oregon to complete the task in the allotted time. Only about half the enumerators needed have thus far been employed. This is in part probably due to a misunderstanding regarding the pay of enumerators. These people are paid so much per farm, set down in the schedule. The rates set were arrived at by taking the prices paid in 1935 and 1940 and the number of farms enumerated per hour in those years. It is intended by the Bureau of Census that an enumerator working 8 hours a day should make from \$8 to \$14 per day.

Every district has a set rate, and by multiplying the rate per farm by the number of farms enumerated in 1935 and 1940 an individual would make from \$1.10 to \$1.65 an hour. The lower rate is for areas where travel between farms is not great and over good roads. The higher bracket is for the isolated communities where difficult terrain is encountered and great distances traveled.

SHOE BUYERS TO GET WARNING

Following word today from the national OPA shoe rationing division that no change will be made in the current shoe regulations affecting the validity dates of airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 in ration book three, Glen E. Fox, Portland district OPA shoe rationing representative, said this means that at least 30 days will be given to the public before any current shoe stamps will be terminated.

Present OPA shoe rationing regulations make this provision, he pointed out.

Fox said that the statement from Washington was made "after a careful survey of the shoe supply situation throughout the country."

PEACH LEAF CURL IS EXPLAINED

Peach leaf curl is a fungus disease that causes a great deal of damage to peaches. It causes leaves to become distorted, curled and wrinkled into odd shapes. The damages reduce the fruit production in proportion to the leaf surface lost, according to Frank E. Hackler, assistant county agent.

A good thorough application of Bordeaux mixture 12-12-100 in strength, applied before the fruit buds begin to swell is a cheap, effective control measure. This treatment must be applied very soon, because fruit buds usually start swelling around the first part of February.

RATIONING CALENDAR

Processed Foods—Book 4: Blue stamps X5 through Z5, and A2 to G2 valid indefinitely.

Meat, Butter, Cheese — Book 4: Red stamps Q5 through X5 valid indefinitely.

Sugar—Book 4: Sugar stamp 34 valid indefinitely, 5 pounds.

Gasoline Coupons — Not valid unless endorsed. "A" 14 expires March 21, 1945. Each coupon worth 4 gallons. Write new license plate number on book cover or identification folder only.

Fuel Oil—Period 4 and 5 coupons (1943-44 series) and period 1 and 2 coupons (1944-45 series) valid through August 31, 1945. Not more than 40 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.
