All our great leaders are struggling for solutions to a permanent peace, but the solution lies only at the battle front. When our armies at the north, east, south and west shall have converged at the pyre of a great nation, then we will have peace. May the facts of the struggle and all its philosophies and idealogies be recorded for the future of mankind, and may we have a historical lesson that will last for 1000 years.
