RE-CAP PRONTO, DRIVERS TOLD

NEW YORK, Feb. 17—Any A-card motorist who is delaying recapping in hope of getting new tires may be walking soon, the rubber experts believe.

They point out that fewer than 5,000,000 new passenger tires will be released for rationing in the first three months of this year.

"Barely enough to keep the B and C cars rolling," says C. R. Mason, service manager of the B. F. Goodrich company.

Recapping is the only way the average motorist can keep going, government and industry experts say, and motorists have been putting off recapping to such an extent that transportation men are worried.

If you're an average driver, two of the tires on your car may need attention.

In Pittsburgh, tire men from the office of price administration found that on 9000 cars checked, 16,000 tires needed recapping.

In Columbus, a survey of 8000 cars showed 14,000 tires worn close to the danger zone.

Mason, using industry figures and the OPA survey, believes something like 46,000,000 tires need recapping or replacement right now. That is nearly twice as many as were recapped in all of last year, he says, speaking strictly of civilian passenger car tires.

Government spokesmen have warned that tire makers are concentrating on heavy-duty equipment.

The Rubber Manufacturers' association reports tire production, which dropped to 2,500,000 in 1942 from 50,000,000 in 1941, had risen to only 4,909,000 in the third quarter of last year. Unofficial estimates of 1944 output are around 18,000,000, against an original goal of 30,000,000. Industry estimates of 1945 production run around 22,000,000, the adjusted but unmet goal of 1944.

The tire companies want to see more recapping now, partly because they want to keep motorists—future customers—rolling, and partly because they aren't permitted to sell new tires to all drivers. Many dealers still have top-grade recap material, 100 per cent synthetic rubber. The balance, while only 60 per cent synthetic and 40 per cent reclaim, is better than the all reclaimed rubber "camelback" they could use earlier in the war.
