H. GILLANDERS SERVICES HELD

Funeral services for Herbert Gillanders were held from the Presbyterian church in Stanfield February 28, with the Rev. W. A. MacArthur of Hermiston giving the sermon.

Mr. Gillanders was 58 years old and was born at Dayton, Ore., on July 4, 1886. He married LaVerne McCall of McMinnville July 28, 1910. To them were born two children, Herbert and Doris (Mrs. Walter B. Merrill) who survive.

The Gillanders have lived on their farm on the Meadows for 22 years, and until the past few years Mr. Gillanders did the farming.

He is survived by his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Doris L. Merrill of Eugene, a son-in-law, Walter B. Merrill, and another son, Herbert Earl Jr. of the U. S. Army, one sister, Mrs. Pearl Crabtree of Portland, and a brother, Earl, of Pendleton. Also one granddaughter, Janet Merrill, survives.

Music was furnished by Mrs. Roy Taylor who sang Face To Face, The Old Rugged Cross, and Mrs. Earl Gillanders accompanied her.
