 With his nephew, Harold, son of the founder, Mr. Helliesen continues to operate the lumber company. Their outlook for the future is to assist in the planning and building of homes, business and farm buildings to meet the requirements of the modern electrical age. His own home is all-electric, with range, water heater, refrigerator, and a number of small time-saving electrical appliances.
