These are not paved highways in any sense of the word but make it possible for the ditchriders to follow the canal, saving many miles of travel and permitting the ditchriders to give more efficient service. In connection with these new roads, the water users are reminded that the ditch right-of-way must be kept passable at all times and cattle-crossings will need to be installed in place of gates on some farms.

How to do with eggs

In times like these it's a wonderful thing to know a lot about eggs... For best volume eggs should be at room temperature before beating. Eggs should always be cooked at low temperatures as high temperatures toughen the protein. Beat egg yolks slightly with spoon in top of double boiler; add sugar and salt; mix well; add milk; and cook over rapidly boiling water about 10 to 15 minutes, or until mixture is slightly thickened and coats spoon, stirring occasionally. Remove from stove at once; add flavoring; and pour into cool bowl. Chill before serving. Makes 2 1/2 cups custard.
