OREGON TO AID CANCER CONTROL

Oregon will take an active part in the \$5,000,000 national "Cancer Control" campaign, April 16 to 30 inclusive, according to David B. Simpson, of Norris Beggs & Simpson, of Portland, who is managing the American Cancer Society's drive in Oregon.

"One out of every eight people in the United States will die of cancer," said Simpson in speaking of the coming drive, "unless we wake up and do something about it. The drive has a three-fold purpose—first, to educate every man, woman and child on the symptoms of early cancer and the necessity of immediate diagnosis and treatment; second, special service in the field of cancer; and third, cancer research.

OFFICERS ARE TO MEET SOON

The Federal Bureau of Investigation plans to conduct a law enforcement conference in the junior high school building in Pendleton at 7:00 p. m. on Monday, April 16. All officers are extended invitations to attend the conference.
