ladies to express their views on city betterment. Many fine suggestions were received. Stating that it was probably not the proper place to discuss the matter, President Harkenrider, nevertheless, brought up the matter of stray dogs and damage being done to new lawns, shrubbery and victory gardens. It was suggested that the city council look into the matter at once.

The following resolution has been presented to the council, "Be it hereby known, that the Hermiston Chamber of Commerce, representing some 73 business men and women in town, request immediate steps be taken to license all dogs, and impound all dogs found not having proper license tags. The town is in a state of emergency as far as this situation is concerned. The grade school children are being molested, the owners of property are suffering damage to landscape improvements, and several owners of hunting dogs and other valuable canines report violence done to the animals as a result of an indignant population."

"It is the desire and hope of the Chamber that further delay in eliminating this menace will not occur, but that you as a Council will inaugurate immediate measures to enforce an ordinance which we understand already exists."

President George Harkenrider established Friday, April 17, as official city cleanup day and urged cooperation in the matter. Further details on the project will be announced next week.
