**The Lost Power of German Reasoning**

We find ourselves lost in the labyrinth of reasoning when we try to analyze why the German people do not lay down their arms. Knowing ourselves and our purposes, and knowing the Germans as a highly intelligent race of great achievements through the last century, it is very difficult to understand why they have allowed themselves to be led into the greatest mistake of all history, and why, when they find themselves helpless to carry on, they do not trust to the better elements of civilization to restore them to a new national life. We do not believe that they hate and distrust America, though they may hate and envy our power and distrust our military strength. They may hate England and France, and greatly fear Russia because of years of jealousies and conflict, but General Eisenhower, as a military statesman, has repeatedly told them that if they would lay down their arms they would not be mistreated. He is the commander in chief of all armies and is to be the general in charge of post war Europe, and he is an American to the core.

It is true that Germany knows that we caused its defeat in 1918, and they know that we have brought about a greater defeat in this war. And they must know that we sacrificed sons and billions of dollars in World War I and received no territory and collected no war debts. They know that we did not provoke this war, and must know that we have no Imperial aims. All our history shows that. If they have the slightest belief in Christian civilization they know that we are charitable, and liberal, and have always only fought for freedom and the advancement of the individual. All thinkers of Germany know our history and the advancement we have made under our form of government. Why then should they seek to destroy all they have before the advancing armies of America with their immense equipment, when these armies offer peace and restoration? Though they may have been taught the doctrines of superman and the beliefs in Nazism during the last quarter of a century, there

are millions of men in Germany who should and do know these falsities, and at least, that they must surrender such beliefs. The great enigma is yet why seek such self destruction and a set back of a great nation for perhaps more than a hundred years. And their conduct has wrought a tremendous blow to all modern civilization, unless philosophers and statesmen are able to prepare a peace structure that will enable humanity to attain a new place on earth.
