Morrow county Pomona met last Saturday, April 7th, at Rhea Creek Grange hall. In spite of the down pour and busy season, a large crowd was in attendance.

Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Wicklander, state grange organizer and district juvenile organizer, respectively, were present and gave some information of special interest to members.

The afternoon program included such speakers of note as Lt. Delaney on Civil Air Patrol; Mr. Ellison, rural electrification administration on power; Commissioner Garnett Barrett on Morrow county hospital; County Agent Ebert on agricultural problems; Mrs. Jack Mulligan on cancer control; and Mrs. R. B. Rice explained the newly organized O.P.A. pannel.

The degree of Pomona was beautifully exemplified by the Rhea Creek team, who are to be congratulated on their fine work. A resolution of public interest passed by the Pomona pertained to daylight saving time we are now living under, and proposed a permanent return to regular time. Other matters coming before the meeting were talks on legislation by Henry Peterson, who gave the highlights on the recent session and discussed to some extent Bills No. 62 and 80; George Peck spoke on the tax situation, while Orville Cutsforth, R. B. Rice and S. J. Devine spoke on county affairs in general.

ECHO NEWS ITEMS

T/Sgt. Zoeth F. McFaul, son of Mrs. Nona H. McFaul of Echo, and Miss Minnie Sorbie of Lark Hall, Scotland, were married March 10 at an undesignated place in Scotland. Sgt. McFaul writes that the marriage was approved by the military authorities and he was given a 7-day furlough for the occasion. He is now stationed somewhere in the British Isles, presumably in Scotland, with the army airways communications system. Prior to that he was in Iceland for about two years.

Joe Middleton has been in the Pendleton hospital for the past week and for a few days was seriously ill. Reports last week Thursday were that his condition was much improved.

Mr. and Mrs. William N. Bohms whose son, Pvt. Max Erwyn Bohms, was reported missing in action this week, are of the opinion that he has merely become detached from his company in the push through Germany and that he will show up all right. Max went overseas last fall and just before leaving had a furlough which he spent in Echo helping his father harvest his alfalfa crop. The Bohms have three other sons in service: Pfc. Lynn H. Bohms entered the service in 1942 and is with the coast artillery in the

Aleutians. He was home on a furlough in June 1943. Machinist Mate 1/c Lyle R. Bohms completed his boot training in the navy in November, 1943, and is somewhere in the Pacific area. T/Sgt. Rex Stanley Bohms is in England with the air force. He was in Hawaii during the Jap attack on Pearl Harbor.

Extensive improvements have been completed in the Echo Hotel. The former lobby has been redecorated and booths installed for serving barbecue lunch and soft drinks to women and children away from the pastime counter.

An extension of the road through Echo cemetery was graded this week by the county grader and will be surfaced the last of the week with crushed rock secured from the Hewett company.

Mrs. William Helmick, local chairman of the Red Cross drive, reports total collections of \$873.21. She is joined by Mr. Savage, county chairman, in thanking all the workers who helped in making the drive a success.

Anyone in this vicinity who has old clothes to contribute to the collection for the relief of inhabitants of the liberated areas in Europe is requested to leave them at the home of Mrs. William Helmick, who has been named as local chairman of this drive.

William Gorrell is to graduate from an air corps training course at a camp in Phoenix, Arizona, on April 16. He is expected to go overseas for active duty soon after that date. Mrs. Gorrell has been with him at Phoenix for several weeks, but will return to Echo to reside for the duration.

Mr. and Mrs. Arne Pajari and son arrived Wednesday from Reedsport for a visit with Mrs. Pajari's parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Middleton. They plan to remain here until Earl Middleton arrived on furlough from an eastern army camp. He is expected about April 8.

Fred W. Andrews, who has been a patient at Pendleton hospital for several days, is reported to be improving rapidly.
