**RATIONING CALENDAR**

**Processed Foods**—Book 4: Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2; Blue stamps N2 through S2 valid through June 30; Blue stamps T2 through X2 valid through July 31; Blue stamps Y2, Z2, A1, B1 and C1 valid May 1 through August 31.

**Meat, Butter, Cheese**—Book 4: Red stamps Y5 through D2 valid through June 2; Red stamps E2 through J2 valid through June 30; Red stamps K2 through P2 valid through July 31; Red stamps Q2, R2, S2, T2, and U2 valid May 1 through August 31.

**Sugar**: Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2; Sugar stamp 36 valid May 1 through Aug. 31.

**Shoes**—Loose stamps invalid. Book 3: Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid. New shoe stamp to become valid August 1.

**Gasoline**—Coupons not valid unless endorsed. "A" 15 coupons, 4 gallons each, valid through June 21. "B" 6-7 valid, 5 gal. each. "C" 6-7 valid, 5 gal. each.

**Stoves**—Apply local board for oil, gas stove certificates.

**Wood, Coal, Sawdust**—Dealer determines delivery priority from consumer's written statement of annual needs and quantity on hand.

**Fuel Oil**: Period 1-5 (incl.) coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 90 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.

**Price Control**—Refer inquiries and complaints to price clerk at local board.

**Rent Control**: In areas under Federal rent control, all rented dwelling units must be registered, and changes in tenancy reported.

**ECHO NEWS ITEMS**

S/Sgt. Elden Smith, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy A. Smith of Echo, who has served with the 5th air force, is now assigned to the AAF redistribution station No. 4 at Santa Ana, army air base. Sgt. Smith entered the service on July 18, 1940, and went overseas in January, 1942. He is entitled to wear five battle stars and the distinguished unit citation for his participation in the Asiatic Pacific theatre. At the Santa Ana redistribution station combat returnees of the AAF receive complete medical examinations, classification inter-

views and reassignment to domestic stations of the army air forces.

No details of the death of Sgt. Willard R. Weltzin, who was killed in action in Germany on March 1, have been received by his mother except a letter from a chaplain of his division. He states that the tank commanded by Weltzin was hit and he was killed instantly. The location of his death was not given but the letter stated his burial was in a cemetery in Holland. The chaplain said Sgt. Weltzin had many friends in the second armored division of the ninth army and was a good soldier. He saw action with his division in North Africa, Sicily, Belgium, France, Holland and Germany.

"I remember Seaside as it was 59 years ago, when I moved here with my parents. It was a vacation spot then, but there were only a few scattered houses and limited hotel accommodations. Two to three hundred vacationists made a record season, and most of them brought tents and spent the entire summer.

"Seaside's early electric system would get over-loaded with only a few hundred

vacationists in town. Lights would often burn only a cherry red, interruptions were frequent, and oil lamps were standard equipment in every household.

"Ever since PP&L took over here, the company has been a great factor in the steady growth of Seaside, anticipating our electrical needs and supplying dependable service under all kinds of conditions."

Mr. Loughton, a native of Astoria, has been a resident of Seaside since 1886. His first job was in the old Logan mill where a steam engine drove the dynamo supplying Seaside's first electric service—available at first to only a limited number of business houses.

After leaving the mill, he drove a horse-drawn stage between Seaside and Arch Cape, the 28 miles constituting a dawn-to-dark trip. With no roads, the route was down the sandy beach, and departure time depended on the tide.

While driving stage, Mr. Loughton became convinced of the development possibilities of the coast communities, and in 1908 entered the real estate business. He has taken an important part in the development of both Seaside and Cannon Beach. He served as postmaster at Seaside for a total of 19 years, and served eight years on the city council, including one year as mayor.
