CANNING SUGAR SOON AVAILABLE

The local War Price and Rationing board expects to do a mail order business in issuing canning coupons starting May 15. To save time on part of the local board, it is urged that applicants simply drop a card in the mail requesting the application form, fill it out completely, attach spare stamp 13 for each member of the family named in the application, and mail it back to the board.

The board will issue coupons in 1-pound and 5-pound denominations, but 15 pounds is the maximum any one person can obtain, with not more than 120 pounds for any family regardless of size. For fruits, sugar will be issued on the basis of one pound for each four quarts of canned fruit.

Sugar stocks are the lowest since war began with military needs high. For this reason, only sugar actually needed for home canning will be issued. There will be no replacement of stamps lost, so everyone should take special precaution in the handling of ration stamps.
