### STOCKMAN LISTS FIVE VACANCIES

Congressman Lowell Stockman will have three vacancies at the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, New York, for the class beginning July 1, 1946.

Mr. Stockman also will have two vacancies at the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, for the class beginning July 1, 1946.

Candidates for the Military Academy must have reached their seventeenth birthday, but must not have reached their 22nd birthday on the date of entrance to the Academy.

Candidates for the Naval Academy must be not less than 17 years of age nor more than 21 years of age on April first of the calendar year (1946) in which they enter the Naval Academy.

Applicants for both Academies should be high school seniors or graduates of high school, or college students. The Civil Service Commission expects to hold a competitive examination July 28, 1945, to aid in the selection of nominees for the Academies. Applicants must be residents of the Second Congressional District of Oregon and in perfect physical condition.

All boys who are interested and qualified should write immediately to Congressman Lowell Stockman, House Office Building, Washington, D. C., so that they may receive additional information and be admitted to the examination.

### FARM WORKERS TO GET GASOLINE

Special gasoline rations will be issued again this year to part-time farm workers under a coordinated government program designed to furnish volunteer labor in shortage areas to agriculture and food processing establishments which harvest or process seasonal crops, E. W. Eggen, OPA mileage rationing representative, announced Tuesday.

In the Portland OPA district, which includes Oregon and south-

western Washington, the emergency farm labor offices will register all part-time harvest workers, Eggen explained, and refer them to farms or agricultural establishments which need their help.

**EMPLOYEE EARNINGS UP.** The average G-E employee earned \$2,772 in 1944. Employees also shared \$234,000 in Suggestion Awards. Top award was \$2,000 for an idea that speeded production of G-E gun control for the B-29. G-E employee suggestions aid the war effort.



**4735 WAR VETERANS HIRSD.** By the year's end 4735 returned service men and women were working at plants of General Electric and affiliated companies. 2986 were former G-E employees.
