William W. McDonald was born in the Highlands of Scotland on December 15, 1858, and died May 14, 1945, being 86 years, 5 months. His father, James McDonald, emigrated with his family to Canada when William was 4 years old. Being of an adventurous nature, he left Canada for the United States at the early age of 14 years where he got work for a time and found an uncle who gave him employment and a home as long as he would stay.

In his wanderings through different states he went to Astoria, Ore., where he was married to Miss Ella A. Short of Klickitat county, Wash., on October 12, 1892. To this union was born a son, Clyde William, now married and living in San Diego.

He leaves behind to mourn his passing one brother, Neal, and a sister, Flora Crossett, of Canada, a nephew, Ray MacDonald, of Grants Pass, a niece, Katherine Steuart, other nieces and nephews, his wife and son and two grand children, William K. and Gloria June.

He was employed in various occupations but his favorite one was mining in which he was quite successful. He went to Alaska during the famous Klondyke gold rush over the perilous Chilkoot Pass the winter of 1888-89. He made many trips back and forth, 16 in all, but none so dangerous as the first one.

In 1937 he moved to Boardman where he resided until his death.
