### Good Luck to the New Publishers

On this last day of May, 1945, the present publishers are turning the Herald over to the new owners, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Bartlett.

Way back during the dark days of the depression, December 4, 1930, Miss Pauline M. Stoop (now Mrs. Harry Smith) and Alfred Quiring began their first experience in the newspaper publishing field when they purchased the Herald from Jack Biggs. Miss Stoop sold her interest in the Herald April 1, 1939, to Leander Quiring, who with his brother continued to serve Hermiston and the surrounding communities. This partnership was interrupted this week when Leander was inducted into the armed forces.

During this time we have attempted to publish the Herald to the best of our ability. The paper has been in the mail on Thursday night every week during this entire period, and the subscription list has grown from a paid circulation of 600 to 1500 subscribers.

We wish to take this opportunity of thanking the local merchants and the many subscribers of the Herald for their loyal support given during the past fourteen and one half years in publishing the Herald. Our stay in Hermiston has been a most pleasant one, and although our future plans are indefinite, the dear friends we have learned to know will never be forgotten. Hermiston will always have a warm spot in our hearts.

In turning over the Herald to the Bartletts, who have had many years of newspaper experience in Nebraska, Idaho, and Oregon, and who are already well acquainted here having lived here for the past three years, we feel confident that the new publishers will continue to faithfully serve this territory.
