Tax Apportionment Increased
Almost one-half of the cost of public schools in Oregon is now

being paid by revenue from the two state income taxes, personal and corporate. Umatilla county will receive \$366,390 from these sources during the coming 1945-46 school year, while the state total is roughly \$13,000,000 of income tax revenue based on the 1944-45 figures. This amount of income tax proceeds goes to public schools throughout Oregon partly as result of laws enacted by the 1945 state legislature.
