

'My whole intent behind this is to try to refocus the importance of why we do what we do," he said. "A good mission statement sets the tone, sets the direction for the department on a very broad scale. It doesn't need to be long like our old statement. It can be clear, concise and to the point."

Edmiston created the new statement with the seven other HPD supervisors, including four sergeants who started working a new 12-hour shift schedule Jan. 5. Each sergeant will supervise a team consisting of two patrol officers and a corporal — a new lead officer position also created last week, Edmiston said. Each team will alternate between 28-day rotations on the day shift, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., and the late shift, 8 p.m. to 8 a.m., with two teams working each shift at any given time, he said.

Edmiston said one of the two teams on either shift will work Mondays, Tuesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, and the other team will work Wednesdays and Thursdays, and the teams will alternate weekly, providing each team with a

weekend off every 14 days. "That's huge in the sense of being able to plan things, to do things with the family, having some down time on the weekends, which

are typically are busiest times," he said. "The most they work is three 12-hour shifts, three days in a row. That was appealing to me because, I think, if you get into having somebody work four 12-hour shifts in a row, you can get into sleep deprivation and possibly poor decisions from that."

Edmiston said he had been contemplating the most efficient way to organize the schedule and department's use many types, but he chose this schedule because the officers on each team will work together and have days off together

throughout the year. "There's peer accountability when you know you're working with the same group of officers for the entire year, he said. "The tangible thing I am after is the camaraderie, the teamwork, the peer ac-

countability." City Manager Byron Smith supported the idea, Edmiston said, as did the Hermiston Police Association, which approved a memorandum of understanding about the schedule change. He said he has also received compliments from some of the officers and will continue to monitor the new schedule.

"I'm a little guarded in making sure this accomplishes two goals: One, it's beneficial to the department and the city, and, two, it's beneficial to the individual employee," he said. "I think it's a fine line and something I'll have to keep a close eye on."
