

(BPA) will make major improvements to the McNary Substation in Umatilla, Oregon. The substation improvements are necessary to meet the growing power needs in the area, to integrate new generating resources, and to support a safe and reliable BPA transmission system.

The project will physically expand the substation and include the installation of power transformers, circuit breakers, disconnect switches, and other equipment.

Construction activities will normally take place on weekdays between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. There will be increased noise levels typically associated with construction activities and, at times, there will be a slower traffic flow on Hwy 730 due to the movement of heavy equipment.
