Turning the corner?

t the beginning of basketball season, a number of questions surrounded the Hermiston boys team. How will the five football players handle the quick turnaround? Do they have enough replacements from last year's Columbia River Conference championship team? What will the team look like under new coach Jake McElligott?

These were questions that required time to be answered. Nothing was going to happen quickly.

Early on, those questions appeared to be answered. How will the five football players handle the quick turnaround? Not well. Do they have enough replacements? Doesn't look like it. What will the team look like under McElligott? Not that good ... yet.

But those were early answers. Maybe too early. Probably too early.

Then the losses started to rack up. The Bulldogs looked out of sync. The offense was rushed, and the defense was uninspired. McElligott has talked about consistency all year, and that's been the Bulldogs' greatest weakness. They play a really good quarter, then follow it up with a poor one and hand over momentum like they owed it to the other team. They have a solid game and come back with a stinker.

But there was a light, a shining, glorious light that shown through the clouds. It was Thursday's thrashing of the Hood River Valley Eagles 84-58.

Now, there are a couple caveats about this game. First, Hermiston shot 14-for-23 from three-point range. I don't have to tell you that percentage is an aberration. I mean, if you shoot 61 percent from deep, you should win. Second, Carson Lloyd played out of his mind. I'm not discounting what he did because he played great, and he's been playing better every game I've seen him. But he isn't going to shoot 7-for-8 every game, either. But they won, and they won big on senior night. They didn't win 84-83. They won by 26. That high of a point total by that large a margin means they played well offensively and defensively, save five three-pointers from Hood River's Skyler Hunter in the fourth quarter.



So how did Hermiston do in those three pillars Thursday night?

Defense: check. McElligott gave his team an A- on the night. He liked the toughness down low. He liked how they forced tough shots and contested most everything. He said they were a little less tough in the third quarter and lost track of some shooters, but, overall, the score spoke for itself.

Rebounding: check. For the most part, Hermiston dominated the glass. Hood River struggled to keep possessions alive with offensive rebounds as Hermiston cleaned the glass, and the Bulldogs gave themselves second chances throughout the night. McElligott singled out the three primary rebounders — Keegan Crafton, Landon Gammell and Cole Smith — for their work on the glass.

"I thought Cole's effort and Landon's effort and Keegan's effort on the boards was great," the firstyear coach said. "They worked their butts off."

Turnovers: check. Hood River threw multiple defensive looks at Hermiston. They went fullcourt man, three-quartercourt trap, 1-2-2 press and 2-1-2 press, and Hermiston handled them all. That was all on point guards Lloyd and Austin Naillon, who never panicked and methodically worked the ball up the court.

"That's what tough teams do," McElligott said. "Tough teams finish the game when they have to."

I was really impressed with how the Bulldogs played. It was by far the best game they've played this year and the best game I've seen them play. It's the kind of game that can make noise in the playoffs and the kind of game that can beat Pendleton on Tuesday.

Echo's first wrestling season a success

Monte Tombs building a solid foundation

When Monte Tombs took over the infant Echo-Stanfield wrestling program, he said the focus wasn't on winning — yet — but instilling the love of the sport and building a foundation.

After a disappointing first day at the 3A Special District 1 meet Friday, that message was still firm.

"Pretty much every kid we have is a first-year wrestler," he said after the meet. "They stuck it in there. They battled. Even though we didn't win a match today, we still fought through every match."

The Cougars were pinned in every bout Friday by wrestlers from throughout the district. That didn't matter to the wrestlers, however, who looked at the experience in a positive light.

Both Jason Fitzpatrick and Colton Evans said they rate this year an 11 out of 10, and both guaranteed they will wrestle next winter.

Both said they learned a lot about the sport and themselves, agreeing they've grown to love the sport and what it means. Evans said he has learned not only wrestling skills, but life skills, too.

"For them to come out, saying that they love the sport that much ... That means a lot to me," Tombs said.

Evans, in particular, can

point to one area of growth above all others these past three months. "In the beginning of the

year, I thought I was mentally tough," Evans said. "I found out not so much. Now, it definitely shows that sticking with it and going hard at it, my mentality changed a lot."

Echo was without its most experienced wrestler, Hayden Hilliard, Friday, who was bull-riding instead. He was the only member of the Echo team not present at the district meet, but Tombs wasn't disappointed. And aside from Hilliard, everyone who was at the district meet was at the first practice in December. To Tombs, that's a win right there.

"We pretty much ended with the same kids that we started with," Tombs said. "Even established programs don't have that kind of (dedication) — they have a lot more kids that quit and everything else. To be ending with what we started with, that's huge right there."

Moving forward, it's a steady climb upwards. Tombs pointed out he doesn't have to teach the basics to this core group of mostly freshmen anymore. He said most of the wrestlers had no idea what a double-leg was, or even a singlet, at the start of the season. Now, however, their focus is on mat time.

"The only thing that matters is the mat time," Evans said.

Bulldogs clip Eagles

Lloyd nets 18 in first start

On senior night at The Dawghouse, an unexpected guy stole the show. In his first start as a varsity player, Carson Lloyd dropped 18 points on 7-for-8 shooting — including 4-for-5 from three-point range — as the Hermiston boys basketball team routed the Hood River Valley Eagles 84-58 Thursday night. It's the highest point total recorded by Hermiston this season, and the highest since it posted 69 against these same Eagles last month.

Chase Knutz led all scor-

behind Pendleton, who the Bulldogs will play at Warberg Court in its final game of the year Tuesday.

"You could tell in their eyes they were ready to play, and they really wanted to make a statement," McElligott said. "It's been an upand-down season — more down than up — and these guys have worked hard for four years of their life, and they didn't want to leave a bad taste in their mouths coming in at home and playing poorly."

"Everyone was feeling confident," Lloyd added. "We were all ready to get the win, especially after coming out with a tough loss (to The Dalles on Tuesday). We were just ready to bounce back and do good things."

As a team, the Bulldogs shot a season-best 14 of 23 from deep. The Bulldogs were plus-three in turnovers and recorded a season-high in assists, too, with 20.

It was one part of a three-part philosophy McElligott preaches: defense, rebounding and turnovers. He calls them the pillars.

"Any time those pillars fall, the building crumbles," he said after Thursday's win. The important thing to look for in Hermiston is that consistency. Can the Bulldogs have that same energy, that same fight, that same focus on Tuesday? Can they use this momentum to get things going positively? Was it just a brief glimpse of what could have been in an otherwise forgettable season?

I don't know those answers. But I do know that Hermiston's season is finishing how it started: with questions. And only time will answer them.

Stanfield holds on, makes history Thursday

Tigers lose to Pilot Rock Friday

For the first time in six years, the Stanfield girls basketball team won a playoff game.

The Tigers took a 10-point lead into halftime and held off a Culver late run before securing a close 26-22 squeaker Wednesday.

Bailey Watson and Cynthia Curiel led Stanfield with five points apiece.

"We're all hyped," sophomore guard Watson said, whose free throw gave Stanfield a much-needed five-point lead down the stretch. "At the beginning of the season, we didn't expect this. It's crazy. It hasn't happen for six years, since 2009. We're pretty excited. This hasn't happened for a long time."

The win was a culmination of a series of hurdles, as head coach Daniel Sharp put it, for a team and a program that has been a doormat in the 2A Columbia Basin Conference — and before that the Blue Mountain Conference — for years. That 2009 team was the No. 5 seed in the district tournament, so the 2014-15 Tigers have already made headway.

"We've talked about overcoming hurdles," Sharp said. "You win that first game of the season, OK. (We) win the second game, we got two. Now we need a league game. We got that hurdle. ... It was always
