## Umatilla boys receive seven all-league selections, girls five

The state-bound Umatilla boys basketball team cleaned up in 3A Eastern Oregon League All-League selections, garnering seven selections in total.

Umatilla's seven selections were the most in the league, with league champ Nyssa garnering four, and Vale and Riverside had three each.

Vikings were Three named to the first team:

senior guard Dany Ayala, senior forward Andrew Jaime and senior wing Eric Garcia. Two Vikings were named to the second-team: junior wings Juan Coria and Tristen Sanguino. Two more received honorable mentions: senior forward Aaron Simmons and freshman guard Kaden Webb.

Ayala was the catalyst to Umatilla's offense, racking up assist numbers and sparking runs by attacking the basket. Jaime alternated starting and coming off the bench and provided energy, rebounding and some scoring. Garcia, last year's EOL Player of the Year, led Umatilla with accurate three-point shooting and overall scoring.

Coria and Sanguino helped stretch defenses with shooting and also helped clean the glass and play defense. Simmons was a big body down low and helped protect the rim. He could also stretch defenses with solid thre-point shooting and was a decent rebounder. Webb, who didn't see serious playing time until about the second half of the season, came off the bench in place of Ayala and hit clutch 3s when Umatilla needed them most, especially in two games against

For most of the year, Watson led the team in scoring, including a couple games in the high 20s. Galbraith provided significant energy from the three spot and was the anchor on defense. Dohman and Campos were each solid on the block and provided good low-post scoring and rebounding.

Vale's senior guard Hawkins Kami named the league's player of the year, and the Vale Vikings led the league with six selections in total. Nyssa garnered three selections, and Riverside earned two nods.

## Stanfield girls feeling positive about season

When the 2014-15 basketball season began in November, the Stanfield girls program was in disarray. The team had lost its last 23 games, and success seemed miles,

Then came a surprising hire. Daniel Sharp, who had been the boys coach at Stanfield for the last six years, was hired as the girls coach, too. With him he brought success: state appearances and league titles, even a third-place ef-

Early on, things didn't go well.

The girls struggled with basic drills. Every practice was as much a lecture as it was a lab, and Sharp never had to lecture to much before.

But as the season wore on, the basketball improved.

"There's times we were in practice, and we looked around like, Wow we actually look like a basketball team," Sharp said. "That was exciting to see.'

Stanfield finished the year with a record of 10-15 (4-6 Columbia Basin Conference), good for a tie with Heppner for third place. Stanfield beat Culver in the play-in round of the district tournament, the first time in six years that Stanfield had

won a postseason game.

After the win over Culver last week, the team floated out of the gym. The Tigers couldn't believe they had won.

'We're all hyped," Bailey Watson said after that game.

But Stanfield ran into a buzzsaw with Pilot Rock, a team that thrashed second-place Weston-McEwen 45-22 in the district title game. The Tigers lost 34-18.

Despite the diffcult ending to the season, the season was a positive experience, overall. After Stanfield's only winning streak of the year — a three-gamer in January, junior guard Yazzmin Chavez said she felt like a basketball player, not someone who plays basketball.

Sharp saw that, too. So did the fans, who started to come to boys' games early to catch the ending of the girls' games. That didn't happen last year.

"I really feel like they started to grasp a vision," Sharp said of his team. "There were some concepts they were taught, and they bought it. You could see them gaining some confidence. They need an offseason to work on things. From when they stepped on the floor in November until now, they're a totally different team. I think a lot of people saw that. I know we saw that.'
