"I was raised that way, and I wanted my children to experience that, too."

After the family moved to Hermiston, with the children still at home, they raised goats and sheep for FFA and 4-H, and everyone worked together on the farm.

Now, with their children all grown, the Warners raise beef cattle, sheep, chickens and a duck, as well as three pet llamas, four dogs and a cat.

Shawn Warner also has an extensive vegetable garden, growing garlic, peas, broccoli and tomatoes, and fruit trees bearing apples, cherries, apri-

cots, peaches and pears. Christy Warner said her husband does most of the outdoor farming activities, although she does step in when needed, fixing things if she can, and administering medicine to animals. She said she has learned a lot of techniques from an old cowboy nearby, although they also use a large-animal veterinarian when necessary.

"We try to make it as functional as we can," she said of their farm.

The apples from their trees are made into cider. Last summer they raised 23 fryer chickens, which they plucked and butchered. Christy Warner also had learned to can and enjoys finding new uses for the vegetables grown in Shawn's garden. Last summer, she perfected a green tomato salsa, which her children all enjoyed.

"And the food just tastes so much better when you grow it," she said.

Communication is key to their success on the farm, Christy Warner said, and her husband agreed.

"And, of course, we have to both want it, or it won't work," Christy said. "It's definitely a partnership."

Part of the appeal of running a farm, Shawn Warner said, is the benefits the family receives from the animals raised and the fruits and vegetables grown.

"You're not dependent on someone else," he said. "You're self-sufficient."

She said the llamas are pets more than anything, although their curious nature makes them useful in scaring away predators that might be after their chickens and sheep.

The Warners sell the beef cows to private buyers. The proceeds usually go back into the farm, to pay for things like irrigation, animal supplies and purchasing hay for the next year. Once, he sold a cow to buy a pickup truck.

"It's not all about making money," Shawn Warner said. "If I'm making money, I buy a cow. I sell it, and then I've got an income. If something was to happen, I have a cush-

They also enjoy sharing their yield with others.

After canning or storing their fruits and vegetables and stocking their shelves for the winter, the Warners take the surplus and give it to friends and family as gifts. Christy Warner said she knows more people who would prefer to receive a bag of onions than a more conventional gift. They also
