Eldrige to retire in 2016 as Umatilla Electric CEO

Steve Eldrige, general manager and CEO of Umatilla Electric Cooperative announced he will retire next year as only the third general manager in the organization's history.

"With UEC's fortunes on the rise, with an engaged membership, an exceptional board and wonderful employees, I am announcing the beginning of another new chapter in my life," Eldrige told attendees of the cooperative's 78th annual meeting April 18 at the Hermiston Community Center. "It has been my honor to serve the UEC membership for the past 43 years. You have entrusted me with work that mattered. Thank you."

Eldrige will retire in early 2016, but an exact date has not yet been announced. The cooperative board of directors will hire a recruiting firm and con-

duct a national search for a new manager.

Jeff Wenholz, president of the Umatilla Electric board, said Eldrige is one the Northwest's most respected utility managers and a powerful voice for the cooperative and other public power utilities.

"He's an important and valuable asset to UEC and will be greatly missed," Wenholz said.

Eldrige was raised in Umatilla and studied electrical engineering at Oregon State University, graduating in 1972, which is the year he was hired as the cooperative's engineer.

He became Umatilla Electric's third general manager in 1990, succeeding Russ Dorran, who held the post since 1971.

Umatilla Electric serves more than 14,000 customer accounts on about 2,300 miles of power lines in service territory from Boardman to the Blue Mountains. Umatilla Electric has grown from about \$19.7 million in revenues in 1990 to an estimated \$90 million in 2015.

Eldrige also serves as chairman of Eastern Oregon Telecom, the Good Shepherd Health Care System Hospital board, Ruralite Services board and the Power Resources Cooperative board and serves on the boards of PNGC Power, Pacific Northwest Utilities Conference Committee and Lightspeed Networks.

From 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., people can recycle various materials at the Uma-

tilla Electric Cooperative parking lot, 750 W. Elm Ave., Hermiston.

The items must be separated before the event because each different type will be handled separately.

Only certain items can be recycled: broken-down cardboard, mixed paper, mixed plastics, used and uncontaminated motor oil in fivegallon-or-less containers, undamaged car batteries, unbroken pallets, electronics, appliances, scrap metal, compost, clean wood up to 12 inches in diameter with no nails or treatments, upholstered furniture, concrete up to two square feet without rebar, latex- and oilbased paint and stain in labeled containers and unmounted tires.






