Brea Kestler signs with Southwestern Oregon

Hermiston setter joins playoffbound Lakers

The first time Brea Kestler visited Southwestern Oregon Community College in Coos Bay weeks ago, she knew immediately it was the place for her.

Hermiston vol-The leyball team setter then worked out with the team. and she called it "the most intense practice I ever had."

Monday, Kestler signed her National Letter of Intent to join the Lakers volleyball program, coached by Steve George. The setter joins a program that finished fourth in the Northwest Athletic Conference south division last year, earning a play-

"(I'm most excited) for our season to start," Kestler said. "I leave Aug. 6, I think, and we have a whole month and a half before school starts just to get conditioning in, and we have our first tournament in California, and we get to go to Six Flags. That's gonna be exciting."

Kestler's journey to Coos Bay began during volleyball season in November. Head coach Becky Wadekamper was compiling film clips of the senior setter and sending them to schools and receiving interest in return. Kestler had been developing a relationship with Walla Walla University, until Coos Bay expressed interest.

She took a trip there a few months ago and felt comfortable right away. She said George is one of the most competitive people she's been around, and the team, by proxy, is very competitive, too. Wadekamper believes

that Kestler, who is also competitive and "feisty" on the court, will fit in wonderfully.

"She has a real passion for the game," Wadeka-mper said of Kestler. "Not everybody that plays the game has that. That gives her a lot of drive.

"Once you go to that next level, (competitiveness is) the key thing you have to have," Wadekamper added. "In high school, not everybody's on that. Players are here for different reasons, not just to compete at volleyball, but once you get to the college level, it's all about that.'

Kestler was drawn to George as a coach because of his experience, she said. The 2015 season will be his first in Coos Bay after spending 30 years coaching at various levels. His two daughters are both continuing their volleyball careers into college, and Kestler felt his enthusiasm and knowledge of the game were right for her.

"He's super competitive, and I'm really excited to work with him," Kestler said. "After going through a couple schools, he was definitely the most competitive and the most thriving to win."

Kestler plans on studying education, inspired by her favorite teacher Randy Smith, and SWOCC offers a four-year education program, although she plans on transferring after just two years. Smith's mother also lives in Coos Bay, giving Kestler a friendly face from the start.

Though Kestler will be moving far from home, about 400 miles, Tiffany Maddox, Kestler's mother, will make every game, she said. Plus Coos Bay is close to the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area, which makes her father happy, she said.

"It's gonna work out," Kestler said.



Heading into the 2014-15 basketball season, Tavin Headings wasn't sure what the future held for her. She hadn't played basketball in a year, choosing instead to swim in 2013-14.

She had received some interest from colleges as a basketball player the year before but had to take a break from the hardwood. Her head just wasn't in it any-

After a successful basketball season that saw her named to the first team All-Columbia River Conference squad, first team All-Area team and a second-place finish at the state tournament in March, however, Headings reconsidered playing at the next level and signed a letter of intent Monday to become the newest member of the George Fox Bruins women's basketball program

in Newberg, Oregon.

"They were the whole package," Headings said of George Fox. "I felt at home when I was there. The first time I went there, I was just watching their basketball game, and I met the coach and the team. I felt like I belonged. They were really nice and really welcoming. They didn't treat me like I was just a recruit."
